What is WWN?

The World Wetland Network is an international network of wetland NGOs that works on wetland issues including species and habitat conservation, working with local communities and lobbying. We support NGO's involved in grass roots wetland conservation work. We have an active committee

What we aim to do

The WWN was set up at the World NGO conference on the eve of the Ramsar COP 10 meeting, 2008, and our prime task is to get smaller wetland groups engaged and involved in the Ramsar process. We will do this by:

- · Keeping in contact with the Ramsar Secretariat.
- Provide regular updates for our members.
- Working to prepare NGO's for active engagement in Ramsar COP meetings every 3 years.
- Supporting NGO's at the CoP meetings with structured sessions and briefings.



We will also act as a support network for local organisations, to share knowledge and best practice, as well as to join together on issues of international wetland conservation. We will do this by:

- Maintaining a website with up-to-date resources for local partners.
- Providing a discussion forum for a range of wetland issues
- Develop projects between partners at regional scales
- Promote wetland education and involvement activities
- When necessary, act to make statements to comment on wetland issues of international importance.

What is the Ramasar Convention?

Signed in 1971, the Ramsar convention is an international multilateral agreement that has 170 countries signed up to it. Each signatory county, or contracting party, agrees to designate sites of high conservation value as Ramsar site, and adopt the principle of

'wise use of wetlands' even those with no designation. For more information please check <u>www.ramsar.org</u>, where you will find a full list of contracting parties and Ramsar sites.
